

Answers for Paper 2 Comprehension Exercise #33 ('Conformity')

 The phrase implies the author's <u>disdain</u> towards people who <u>mindlessly follow the crowd</u>, **believing** that it is the best course of action.

*Useful points to take note of:

2. The author is implying that there are <u>certain roles and expectations</u> placed on individuals in society, **which may not be** in sync with <u>people's true identities</u>.

*Useful points to take note of:

3. The author illustrates the tension by observing how children who have grown up to <u>obey the norms</u> from their parents' era frequently <u>push back</u> against these traditions; and students who have been <u>trained to comply</u> to prescriptive methods of solving questions find such learning <u>not exciting but</u> instead dulling for the brain.

*Useful points to take note of:

4. *Conformity fuels mindless consumerism* **by making people** become <u>driven by anxiety</u> at <u>lagging behind</u> others. *Hence*, we <u>keep up with the norm</u> of <u>spending wastefully</u> on <u>things we do not require</u> merely to <u>possess the newest products</u>.

5. The author uses the phrases in this sequence **in order to illustrate** that there is a <u>need for progressive</u> <u>actions</u> from the <u>individual level</u> to the <u>societal level</u> **to challenge the status quo** when it is <u>not just</u> or <u>logical</u>.

6. *The author suggests that the rewards are firstly,* an increased capacity to create revolutionary innovations; *secondly*, having a more dynamic way of life; and *thirdly*, more latitude to imaginatively showcase our unique sense of self.

*Useful points to take note of:

7. *He is implying that not conforming to the group would result in* <u>being viewed negatively by others; being</u> <u>left to defend oneself; facing the possibility of starvation; and experiencing loneliness</u>.

8. *He is suggesting that human nature is* <u>innately passive</u> and <u>self-interested</u> **because** the word 'even' implies that helping the needy is something which is <u>unexpected</u> of humans.

9. The author uses the word 'admittedly' to acknowledge the opposing view that conformity may have a <u>negative impact on one's creativity</u> before presenting her own perspective.

*Useful points to take note of:

10. *Firstly,* Apple has given a <u>high priority</u> on the <u>style and look</u> of their devices. *Secondly*, it has provided a <u>smooth and convenient</u> experience when people use its products.

11. The phrase is "inspired these competitors to outdo Apple at its own game".
